





Rate Reductions for 2022

Looking forward to 2022, there are many questions that we are all facing. What are energy prices going to do? Gasoline, diesel, propane and natural gas are all increasing. How will the increases in energy impact everything else? Will the increase in the price of all goods impact my family's standard of living? As you look at your budget and see how you can adjust to keep things normal for your family, North Central Public Power District (NCPPD) has been looking at its budget and searching for ways to keep more in your pocket during this unstable economic environment.

NCPPD's board has recently approved new rates that will provide for a seven percent reduction in overall rates. This reduction may vary (+) or (–) three percent between rate classes, but as a whole, the rates will be reduced by seven percent. NCPPD continues to evaluate and adjust its operations to provide the best reliability while maintaining an excellent level of value for its customers.

For the second year in a row, the Board of Directors has also passed

through a .006196/kWh Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) credit. The PCA is a credit NCPPD receives from its wholesale supplier, Nebraska Public Power District (NPPD). The PCA credit is applied to customers served wholesale power from NPPD. The rate that the customer receives is the same rate that is credited on the NCPPD wholesale bill. For the average residential customer, the PCA amounts to an approximate savings of five to six percent. Customers in Plainview do not receive the PCA credit as their energy is provided

by the Municipal Energy Agency of Nebraska (MEAN).

The credit given for the PCA is a surplus from NCPPD's wholesale supplier, NPPD, that is passed on to you. This is based on surpluses NPPD has had for the past two years. The PCA is not a permanent credit and whether a credit will be seen in 2023 is not certain. NCPPD will continue working to control costs and provide the best reliability and value for your money.








Electrical System Upgrade Planned for City of Plainview

Safety Tips for the Holiday Season





Keep safety in mind when decorating the home. Ensure that your tree is placed at least three feet away from heat sources, such as fire-places or radiators, and on a stable platform. Before hanging holiday lights, check for worn spots, fraying, and excessive kinking. Damaged strands of lights should not be used. Consider investing in LED light strands. Although they are more expensive than traditional incandescent bulbs, LED lights last much longer and are also more efficient and durable.

Don't get burned in the kitchen. Clean your stove top and oven often, especially before the large amount of baking and cooking that takes place for family gatherings. Doing so will help prevent fires in the kitchen should a malfunction or accident take place. Do not leave combustible items, such as towels or pot holders, near the

stove top. Keep all appliance cords away from heat. Never use appliances near the kitchen sink. Plug appliances into ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) outlets. Unplug your appliances when they are not in use.

Whether you are leaving the home for a few hours or for a few weeks, turn off all lights when they

Irrigation Facility Charge to be billed in February

The 2021 Irrigation Facility Charge for irrigation services that are 15 horsepower or larger will be billed in February. If you have irrigation changes such as load control schedule (i.e. from 3 Day Control to 2 Day Control), or intend to transfer service into another name, please notify our office. New irrigation contracts will need to be completed and returned to our office before any changes on the billing system will be made. An irrigation letter will be mailed out in January indicating all irrigation accounts currently in the customer's name.

Chicken Pot Pie Fettuccine

Ingredients

- 4 Tbsp butter
- 4 Tbsp all-purpose flour
- 1 carton chicken broth (32 oz)
- ½ cup milk
- Salt & pepper to taste
- 34 lbs uncooked fettuccine
- 2 cups shredded rotisserie chicken
- 2 cups frozen mixed vegetables

Directions

In 4-quart pot or Dutch oven, melt 4 tablespoons butter over medium heat; gradually beat in 4 tablespoons all-purpose flour with whisk until mixture is thick and smooth. Gradually pour in 1 carton (32 oz) chicken broth and ½ cup milk, beating until smooth. Season with salt and pepper. Heat to boiling; reduce heat to medium-low. Add ¾ lbs uncooked fettuccine; cook about 20 minutes, stirring occasionally, until tender and majority of liquid is absorbed. Stir in 2 cups shredded deli rotisserie chicken and 2 cups frozen mixed vegetables, thawed; cook until heated through. Season with salt and pepper
