A Challenging Year

As I was driving home the other day, I noticed the

cottonwood trees showing the first hints of gold signaling the coming of fall. We have just come through the summer season for North Central Public Power District (NCPPD). As of August 29, 2022, we have sold a total of 124,881,636 kWh year to date. The 124M kWh is the highest amount sold through the month of August in NCPPD's history. Irrigation usage this year has been steady due to the dry weather. Irrigation kWh sold vear to date has been 68,225,049 kWh. This is also an all-time record. I am sure each irrigation customer is well aware of their contribution to this number. All of this load tested the grid, but for this year it seems to have met the challenge. NCPPD's engineering firm is already doing studies to see what improvements and upgrades are needed to keep up with the load growth.

Supply chain has continued to be a big challenge to the operation of the district. Transformer costs are up over 100% with 120 week lead times for delivery. Currently, the orders that were to be delivered in March have yet to arrive. On the other hand,

some orders that were not to be seen for weeks are being delivered. Poles and overhead wire are also up 50-100% in cost with delivery in 12 weeks and 52 weeks respectively.

It is very difficult to plan and manage work flow when you don't know when you will receive the necessary material and equipment. The relationships that have been fostered over the years with vendors and suppliers have been key in keeping supply available. NCPPD's team has worked to make sure the impact is minimized for the customer from this critical supply issue.

It would be nice to say that supply will straighten out in the next several weeks, but it probably won't. Conversations continue with our vendors, statewide groups and national trade groups; however, they have all said that a return to just-in-time inventory control is not in the near future.

It seems that NCPPD's vendors have been able to supply a majority of hardware, but the key items have such long lead times. In a CoBank meeting that I attended earlier this year, an economist spoke about some of the reasons that are causing this supply issue. The biggest reason across the board is the birthrate in the US and the rest of this planet. We are not replacing the people as

fast as they are dying. There is not a quick fix to this issue. Increases in productivity and efficiency could help. We are in an economic environment that we all have to endure. North Central Public Power District is working in your part of the world to make things work to your betterment. We will continue to provide the best customer service at the best value. Keep safe.

You will see the Global Utility Services pick-ups and ATVs along the roads. Please be aware of these workers and drive carefully.



Easy Pecan Pie Dip with Pie Crust Dippers

Pie Crust Dippers

- 1 Tbsp granulated sugar
- ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 box refrigerated pie crusts, softened as directed on box
- 2 Tbsp butter, melted

Topping

- 4 Tbsp. butter
- ½ cup packed brown sugar
- ½ cup heavy whipping cream
- ½ tsp vanilla
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cup chopped pecans, toasted **Din**
- 1 pkg (8 oz) cream cheese, soft-
- ½ cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup frozen whipped topping, thawed

Heat oven to 425°F. In small bowl, mix granulated sugar and cinnamon. Set aside. Unroll first pie crust on work surface; roll into 12-inch round. Using 2 ½ - 3-inch leaf or desired shape cookie cutter, cut pie crust. Repeat rolling and cutting with second pie crust. Place leaves 1 inch apart onto ungreased cookie sheets. Brush with 2 Tbsp. melted butter. Sprinkle with sugar-cinnamon mixture. Bake 8 - 10 minutes or until golden brown. Cool 2 minutes. Remove from cookie sheet to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 10 minutes. In 2-quart saucepan, melt 4 Tbsp. butter over medium heat. Add brown sugar; cook 2 - 3 minutes, stirring frequently, until mixture is bubbling and sugar dissolves. Reduce heat to low; carefully stir in whipping cream, vanilla and salt. Increase heat to medium; heat to simmering, stirring frequently; remove from heat. Stir in pecans; cool mixture 30 minutes. In large bowl, mix cream cheese and powdered sugar. Beat with electric mixer on medium speed until smooth. Beat in whipped topping until mixed well. Spread into bottom of 9-inch pie plate; top with cooled pecan mixture. Refrigerate at least 30 minutes before serving. Serve with pie crust dippers.
