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Rate Study May Produce Changes

Whew! The last few years have been a challenge. Since the 2020 Covid crisis, everyone has endured the impacts of inflation. The pre-2020 cost of hardware has gone up 20-25%. Poles and transformers have increased almost 200%. Although some of the pole costs have reduced, those pre-2020 prices will probably never be seen again.

Wholesale electric rates have generally held steady over the past four years. From a national perspective, many industries have moved to Nebraska to enjoy the advantages of reliability and steady electric rates. Due to the increase in demand for electricity, our power supplier will need to increase generation and transmission capacity. The expenditure on improvements will amount to well over \$2 billion. The debt service that the power supplier will face will be passed on to North Central Public Power District (NCPPD) and all the other wholesale and retail customers.

Approximately 65% of NCPPD's overall costs are power cost. The balance of overall costs are materials, transportation, overheads, and the most important resource, the employees. NCPPD has been very efficient over the years. In 2000, we had 4836 meters that we serviced with 22 employees. With a 43% increase of meters to 6938 as of 2024, NCPPD

continues to serve its customers with 22 employees.

NCPPD recently had two rate decreases, 2% in 2020 and 7% in 2022. These decreases were managed through the pre-ordering of supplies, tapping cash reserves and day-to-day management of resources by the NCPPD team. We have sustained the decreased rates over the past four years.

We are currently going through a rate study to assess what changes may be needed. NCPPD contracts with a third party rate analyst based in Holland, Michigan. The analyst does rate studies for all sizes of cooperatives, power districts and municipalities nationally and has several clients in Nebraska. At this writing, we are not sure what the exact changes may be for our customers. With the needed generation and transmission by our power supplier and the increases in operating costs, I am sure there will be some sort of increase.

It is the intention of NCPPD to be transparent and give its customers the best information to make their best decisions. We continue to do everything that we can to maintain your quality of service at the highest level. We remain committed to providing the best value for your dollar spent. Keep safe.

What to do before using a **PORTABLE GENERATOR**

Prepare

Install battery operated carbon monoxide (CO) alarms throughout your home; ensure they are working properly.

Position

Place a portable generator outside at least 20 feet from windows and doors: do not use one in a garage or carports.

Carefully review and the follow all manufacturer's instructions.

Protect

If it is wet outside, keep it dry by placing it on a tarp. Position it under a portable canopy (not a carport).

Refuel Safely

Turn off your portable generator and let it cool down before refueling.

Inspect and Maintain
Inspect a portable generator before each use and make sure it is properly maintained.

Using a portable generator can be useful during an outage; however, use one correctly to prevent CO poisoning and to stay safe.

8 Holiday Hacks to Help You Save Energy



Lower the thermostat before holiday gatherings

Holiday cooking and extra warm bodies automatically raise the temperature in your home, so you can save by turning down the heat when guests arrive.

Help your fridge and freezer save energy

Help reduce their energy use with these tips: Make sure to always use safe food handling procedures. Set your refrigerator temperature to between 35 and 38 degrees and your freezer to 0 degrees. Let food cool before putting in the fridge, to keep it from using extra energy to maintain a cool temperature. Cover liquids and wrap foods stored in the refrigerator because uncovered foods release moisture and make the compressor work harder. Don't block air vents with large items – it can make the items freeze and cause other parts to run too hot.

Reduce your hot water use to save on heating costs

How? Here are a few easy ways: Set your water heater temperature to 120 degrees, wash laundry in cold water, always wash full loads of laundry and dishes.

Put lights and decorations on a timer

Use timers to control the amount of time your holiday lights and displays are in action each day, turning them on when it gets dark and off at bedtime. Fewer hours = less energy use on your bill.

Deck the halls with LED Lights

LEDs are ideal for tree and holiday lighting since they are brighter, can last up to 10 times longer than traditional bulbs, use a fraction of the energy of conventional bulbs (about 75% less) and stay cooler, reducing risk of fires.

Adjust your indoor lighting to account for your glowing decorations

Set the holiday mood and reduce energy usage by turning off household lights and letting your holiday LED lights shine as the main lighting source. Bake several dishes at the same time to reduce energy use from your oven Use room-temperature ingredients and cook multiple dishes in your oven at once to conserve energy. And don't open the door to peek – keep the heat where it belongs.

Use a smart thermostat while you're traveling or gone for periods of time

If you travel during the holidays, remember to adjust your thermostat. Making the temperature just a few degrees cooler will have a significant impact.

Tex-Mex Chicken and Rice Soup

Ingredients

2 tbsp butter

1 package (20 oz) boneless skinless chicken thighs, cut in 3/4-inch pieces

½ tsp salt

1/4 tsp pepper

½ cup chopped onion

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

1 carton (32 oz) chicken broth

1 can (14.5 oz) fire roasted

crushed tomatoes, undrained 1 tsp chili powder

½ tsp ground cumin

½ cup uncooked long-grain white rice

1 can (4 oz) chopped green chiles

1 cup frozen whole kernel corn Shredded Mexican cheese blend, tortilla strips and chopped fresh cilantro leaves, if desired

Directions

In 5-quart Dutch oven, melt butter over medium-high heat; season chicken with salt and pepper. Cook chicken in melted butter 6 to 8 minutes, stirring once, until chicken is browned on outside. Using slotted spoon, transfer to bowl; cover and keep warm. Add onion and garlic to butter and drippings in Dutch oven; cook over medium-high heat 30 to 60 seconds, stirring frequently, until softened. Stir in chicken broth, tomatoes, chili powder and cumin; heat to boiling. Stir in rice, chiles, frozen corn and the browned chicken; return to boiling. Reduce heat; simmer uncovered 23 to 28 minutes, stirring occasionally, until rice is tender. Serve soup topped with remaining ingredients.
